Shake over ice, add a twist of jazz, a spritz of adultery, and a little pink umbrella and you've got yourself a 5 o'clock beverage that, given the 1920s setting, you wouldn't be allowed to drink. The one thing all these shows and Gatsby have in

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common is the notion of the American Dream. The Dream has seen its ups and downs. But from immigration (certainly not a modern concern, right?) to the Depression (we wouldn't know anything about that), the American Dream has always meant the

same thing: it's all about the Benjamins, baby. Yet Gatsby reminds us that the dollars aren't always enough. As we learned from Audrey Hepburn in My Fair Lady, you can put on the dress, but you still aren't going to know which fork to use. Especially if you're bootlegging to make

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the money for the dress. Even when they have the cash, newly made millionaires are still knocking at the door for the accepted elite to let them in. If the concept of the nouveau riche (the newly rich) has gone by the wayside, the barriers to the upper echelon (education,

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background) certainly haven't. So there you have it. There's more to the Gatsby cocktail than sex, lies, and organized crime.

Although those are there, too, which, as far as reading the book goes, is kind of a motivation in itself.

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The Common Core State Standards initiated major changes for language arts teachers, particularly the emphasis on “informational text.” Language arts teachers were asked to shift attention toward informational texts without taking away from the
