There is a recognition that our health is affected by many factors including where we live, genetics, our income, our educational status and our social relationships - these are known as "social determinants of health." A social gradient in health runs through society, with those that are poorest generally suffering the worst health.

While there are competing views as to the scale of the influence of the social determinants of health (SDH), figure 1, compiled by the Kings Fund, demonstrates that social and environmental influences are highly significant, contributing to between 45% and 60% of the variation in health status. Providing universal access to good

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healthcare is therefore necessary, but insufficient to optimise the health of populations and reduce inequities in health.
